
# Message from **Board Co-Chairs**



We experienced a year of transition, but thanks to our staff, donors, partners, and associated organizations, we maintained an unwavering focus to our goal of helping combat poverty — one family at a time.

As detailed in this report, we have impacted a lot of lives with our program work funded by our donors in 2023. We have been able to do this while maintaining a low overhead ratio of 22% (cash overhead expenses as a percent of total expenses which includes distributed aid).

Your generosity helped us invest more than \$1.5 million in programs throughout Jamaica, Haiti, Honduras, Guyana, and the Bahamas and we are grateful for your continued trust.

# **Agriculture**

**COMBRIFOL Coffee** Marcala, Honduras

Three year project where coffee farmers are given the tools and training to grow coffee plants and ultimately harvest coffee beans to sell for income generation.

CHICKEN Shed San Antonio, Honduras

Chicken shed built in San Antonio for mothers to raise chickens as a food source and to generate income for the community. This project is a great learning opportunity for the beneficiaries, their families, and the students of the school, who are learning about business processes.

**ONION Farmers** Llandewey, Jamaica

This project provided tools and training for a female farmer from the community of Llandewey in St. Thomas. Through training and the utilization of climate smart agricultural practices, she is working to grow an onion crop to increase her family's income.







# WASH Water, Sanitation, & Hygiene

## "Help a Girl Out" Package Jamaica

Hygiene kits were distributed to young girls in Jamaica by GIK partner "Help a Girl Out." These kits contained essential items such as shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, and menstrual supplies, promoting personal hygiene and empowering girls to manage their health effectively.

## Solar Panel Water Well Honduras

Clean water helps prevent the spread of water-borne illnesses, significantly reduces mortality rates as families now have clean water for hygiene and cooking. The installation of a new solar well also helps families and communities redirect their time and energy towards more productive activities such as learning, income-generating work, or participation in community development initiatives.

## **Healthcare and Hygiene Project Guyana**

A three-day clinic in Baramita, Guyana provided dental care and oral hygiene education to the community. Dentists and hygienists attended to patients while period kits were distributed to young girls and women, enhancing health and hygiene practices throughout the community.



Since 2009, Health Partners International Canada (HPIC) and Food For The Poor Canada have been actively working to support the medical needs of thousands of individuals and their families in Latin America. This partnership has been built with common values, including trust, empathy, and the willingness to make a lasting difference for individuals who lack access to primary healthcare services. Working together in vital health projects, we have built strong and vibrant communities.

"HPIC is deeply grateful for the opportunity to contribute to the work carried out by Food For The Poor Canada and its local partners. In the last four years, HPIC has donated over \$4 million worth of medicines and supplies to support Food for the Poor's healthcare initiatives in Haiti, Jamaica, and Honduras.
